

From our Worshipful Master, Eric Desmond

On the First Day of Creation, God's initial creative act was to speak "light" into existence, bringing order out of chaos and giving structure to a "formless and empty" world. Genesis 1:2. As the Bible later explains, "[t]he light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" – which is to say that "light" drives away the darkness. John 1:5. The creation of "light" did not, however, refer to the formation of the Sun (or the Moon, which Pink Floyd explained in *Eclipse* has no dark side because it is all dark).

My belief is that "light" is an allegory for something more intrinsic and worthwhile to the human condition. Therefore, just as light, whether by Sun, incandescent bulb or candle, overcomes the dark, the Masonic reference to "light" is an allegorical reference to knowledge and that with knowledge a Mason may endeavor to evercome





Religions and societies throughout history have allegorically referred to "light." The Bhagavad Gita states that "I, residing in their heart, destroy the darkness of ignorance by the shining lamp of knowledge." Hindus furthermore celebrate the Festival of Lights, or Diwali, a central theme of which is the victory over (or at least battle between) light over darkness, knowledge over ignorance, and hope over despair. The familiar yin and yang of Chinese philosophy in like manner illustrates how opposing forces (i.e., good and evil) are complementary in that they are both interconnected and opposing.

In Masonry, to me, "light" symbolizes more than the literal absence of darkness in the presence of sunlight, it symbolizes the intention for knowledge to overcome ignorance in the enduring philosophical battle between good and evil or hope and despair. The importance of "light" is reflected in the fact that it is one of the first representations of Masonic ideals presented to the youngest apprentices, with certain tools of operative masons thereafter shown to those apprentices while seated in a specific location in Lodge, architecturally considered to be the least accessible to sunlight, so that they may receive "light."

Freemasonry recognizes the value of battling darkness and ignorance with "light" and knowledge. In doing so, however, I do not believe that Masons naively suggest that darkness and ignorance are easily overcome. Rather, Masons recognize that we, at best, pursue a balance between the darkness of ignorance and "light" of knowledge through our Masonic journey. After all, Masonry's flagship ideal of "making good men better" inherently alludes to the noble journey upon which Masons embark rather than attempting to demarcate the journey's destination.

I believe that receiving "light" in Masonry is best understood as seeking en *light*enment through Masonry, an ever-continuing endeavor to improve oneself with the assistance of one's Brothers. Without such journey – the path for which each Mason sets for himself – growth ultimately stagnates and the journey itself is of little worth. Or, in the words of Brother Benjamin Franklin, "[w]ithout continual growth and progress, such words as improvement, achievement, and success have no meaning."





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I also believe that allegories are useful tools, and recognize that human history has made use of them for various purposes, whether through the older *Aesop's Fables* or the timelier *Animal Farm* by George Orwell. Thus, seeking to receive "light" – or pursuing enlightenment – through Masonry is aptly aided by allegories that reference "light" and darkness or good and evil or hope and despair, which brings us to the most recent improvement to Temple Lodge #16.

Temple Lodge #16 has improved the Lodge through the installation of the Mosaic Pavement below its Altar. By placing the representation of light and darkness, or good and evil, in the center of Lodge, with the Blazing Star placed in the center of the Mosaic Pavement underneath the Altar, it is hoped that candidates and the Brethren alike will more readily visualize the balance of these forces and reflect upon their Masonic journey. In a prior monthly message, in which was introduced the intention to hold a fundraiser for the installation of the Mosaic Pavement, I referenced an early volume of Masonic instruction, and do so again because it reinforces the purpose of this improvement.

As Albert Mackay explains, "[t] he mosaic pavement is an old symbol of the Order. It is met with in the earliest rituals of the last century. It is classed among the ornaments of the Lodge in combination with the indented tessel and the blazing star. Its party-colored stones of black and white have been readily and appropriately interpreted as symbols of the evil and good of human life." See Albert G. Mackey, *An Encyclopaedia of Freemasons and Its Kindred Sciences, Volume II* (New York and London: The Masonic History Company, 1916), p. 493 – 494.

This Mosaic Pavement, with the Blazing Star and Altar placed thereon, is the centerpiece of Temple Lodge #16. Candidates becoming the youngest of apprentices and seasoned Brothers alike will be able to visualize the balance about which we speak during our lectures and lessons, as well as their role in the battle between light over darkness, knowledge over ignorance, and hope over despair. As Shawn Eyer explained better than I ever could, "[w]hen we remember the Blazing Star in the center of the Lodge, this Masonic teaching strongly resembles the ancient Hermetic maxim adopted by so many philosophers, that 'God is an intelligible sphere, whose center point is everywhere, and whose circumference nowhere.' We may stand in awe in contemplation of the Infinite, but more awesome still is the fact that aspects of Infinity are indeed intelligible and may be represented by symbols and referenced by our ritual." David Stewart, W.B. Steven Blake, W.B. Phil Sharkey, III, W.B. Bruce Taylor, Brother Jon Fischer, Brother John O'Reilly and Brother Phil Sharkey, Jr. It should also be noted that without the research and time of Brother Phil Sharkey, Jr. there would likely have been no Mosaic Pavement installation.



And, it is my sincerest hope that this improvement will long serve Temple Lodge #16 as it continues "making good men better."
