From our Worshipful Master, Eric Desmond

Greetings from the East!

As the last quarter of 2025 is upon us, and having just welcomed two Entered Apprentices into the Craft, I find myself thinking about what it means (to me) to be a Mason, and what impact if any my membership in the Masonic institution may prove as time marches on. In doing so, I have found myself thinking about what Masonic Lodges allegorically represent, and whether the allegory is entirely appropriate.

Guilds were formed by artisans for the purpose of providing collective benefits to its members. As Albert Mackey explained, "the object of the early Craft Gilds was to create relations [between its members] as if among brothers; and above all things, to grant to their members that assistance which the member of a family might expect



from that family. . . . [T]he principal object of the Craft Gilds was to secure their members in the independent, unimpaired, and regular earning of their daily bread by means of their craft." See Albert G. Mackey, *An Encyclopaedia of Freemasons and Its Kindred Sciences, Volume II* (New York and London: The Masonic History Company, 1916), pgs. 310 – 311. A guild provided this collective benefit by educating and training its members, by acting to protect its members' collective interests in addition to its own, and by attempting to restrict the practice of the trade or craft to its members.

Consistent with its educational purpose a guild would permit a member to progress through its ranks, starting with entered apprentice and culminating with master. Members achieved higher ranks, or degrees, by receiving increasingly revealing instruction and thereafter showing proficiency through the performance of work. Proficiency for an operative stonemason would have been exhibited by using learned building techniques, along with the tools of the profession, to unite disparate building materials into a final, common structure. See Albert G. Mackey, *An Encyclopaedia of Freemasons and Its Kindred Sciences, Volume II* (New York and London: The Masonic History Company, 1916), pg. 532 ("Freemasonry, in its character as an operative art, is familiar to everyone. As such, it is engaged in the application of the rules and principles of architecture to the construction of edifices for private and public use, houses for the dwelling-place of man, and temples for the worship of the Deity. It abounds like every other art, in the use of technical terms, and employs, in practise, an abundance of implements and materials which are peculiar to itself."). Despite such proficiency, and the intention of operative stonemasons to build enduring temples, monuments and structures, the inevitable truth is that temples, monuments and structures made by hands will yield, whether to war, natural disaster, human "progress," or the unbending and unrelenting march of time.

These two considerations, to me, distinguish the purpose of operative stonemasonry from the purpose of the Masonic institution.

The Masonic institution is designed to make men better and wiser, and does so by instilling principals of equality, morality and uprightness before God and man alike. The Masonic institution is also designed to remind its members to act virtuously, and does so by referencing certain indispensable qualities: temperance, fortitude,





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prudence and justice. Similar to the guild system, a votary of the Masonic institution is presented with increasingly revealing instruction regarding these principles, and is provided with a platform upon which such instruction may be acted upon. Critically, these principles are premised upon the belief that a Mason should seek the welfare of those around him, including the welfare of his family, his Brothers, and his community, with equal intention as he might seek his own welfare.

Such is not the goal of an operative mason's guild.

As noted above, an operative stonemason would show proficiency by using learned building techniques, and the tools of the profession, to build a structure. The act of building the structure benefits the guild and its members. Speculative Masons similarly build, allegorically speaking, but the act of showing greater proficiency is not relegated to conduct within Lodge or to conduct that benefits only the Masonic institution. Rather, when a Speculative Masons shows proficiency – whereby he squares and circumscribes his actions and keeps himself within due bounds in all his societal interactions – the impact of such conduct has the ability to ripple outward. A Brother who acts in a manner consistent with the principles of the Masonic institution, therefore, positively influences others beyond those he has intended to aid and assist.

The Masonic institution has the unique potential to be a positive force for good. By standing uprightly before God and mankind, and being mindful of the virtues of temperance, fortitude, prudence and justice, Masons have the capacity to produce an enduring impact upon the Temple Lodge #16 community, and beyond. We can start within Temple Lodge #16 by contacting Brothers who have not been contacted recently, but also by reaching beyond Temple Lodge #16 to identify neighbors in need of direct assistance or by partnering with the food bank for events such as the Santa Breakfast.

I would also challenge the esteemed, elder Brothers of Temple Lodge #16 to reach out to a newly raised Master Mason or a newly admitted Entered Apprentice, taking time to explain what Speculative Masonry means to them and to discuss ways in which Temple Lodge #16 has in years past reached out to or partnered with the community. By helping the youngest Brothers of Temple Lodge #16 increase their proficiency, all Brothers maybe encouraged to do the same.

As for upcoming scheduled October and November events, there are several which I hope each Brother will consider attending.

- We will be hosting a Table Lodge at Temple #16 on October 16, 2025. This Table Lodge will celebrate Oktoberfest, with a German menu that will include schnitzel and German-style beer brewed by W.B. Phil Sharkey, III and Brother Phil Sharkey, Jr. The table lodge will start at 6:30 PM.




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
