From our Worshipful Master, Eric Desmond

Greetings from the East!

Each journey in Freemasonry starts in the northeast corner of the Lodge where a candidate is instructed to stand a just and upright Mason. Each new Mason is informed of the significance of such placement, in which situation "the candidate becomes as one who is, to all outward appearance, a perfect and upright man and Mason, the representative of a spiritual corner-stone, on which he is to erect his future moral and Masonic edifice." Albert G. Mackey, An Encyclopaedia of Freemasons and Its Kindred Sciences, Volume II (New York and London: The Masonic History Company, 1916), pg. 519. The significant of this northeast corner placement is further explained as follows:



This symbolic reference of the corner-stone of a material edifice to a Mason when; at his first initiation; he commences the moral and intellectual task of erecting a spiritual temple in his heart, is beautifully sustained when we look at all the qualities that are required to constitute a 'well-tried, true, and trusty' corner-stone. The squareness of its surface emblematical of morality – its cubical form, emblematic of firmness and stability of character – and the peculiar finish and fineness of the material, emblematical of virtue and holiness – show that the ceremony of the northeast corner of the Lodge was undoubtedly intended to portray, in the consecrated language of symbolism – the necessity of integrity and stability of conduct, of truthfulness and uprightness of character, and of purity and holiness of life, which, just at that time and in that place, the candidate is most impressively charged to maintain.

The instruction to stand a perfect and upright Mason signifies the manner in which a Mason is to "erect his future moral and Masonic edifice." The term 'edifice,' while suggestive of a physical structure, is derived from the Latin word "aedificare" – which means "to build." The process of building, as relates to speculative Masons, refers not to the building of structures but to that more noble and glorious purpose of building moral, spiritual and intellectual edifices. In doing so, speculative Masons have adopted metaphors and allegories based upon the rules, tools, and principles of the operative builders, while affirming the additional understanding that the erecting of an internal "future" edifice denotes a continual journey commencing for each Mason in the northeast corner of the Lodge that endures, unabated, until that Mason has laid down his working tools.





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Operative Masons use their working tools to build physical edifices, including for the laying of the foundations upon which structures are then erected. While operative Masons use working tools to lay foundations and build physical edifices, speculative Masons make allegorical use of these working tools to lay the foundations of moral, spiritual and intellectual edifices that will be erected over time. Indeed, speculative Masons allude to such operative working tools for the purpose of providing good and wholesome instruction regarding the manner in which Masons meet, the manner in which Masons act toward each other and to all mankind, and the manner in which Masons part (until such Masons meet again). The cyclical nature of the meet, act and part allegory is intended to remind each Mason of the importance of always acting, in Mackey's words, with firmness and stability, with virtue and integrity, and with truthfulness and uprightness of character.

An integral component of such allegories is the guiding principle that each Brother should ever endeavor to support, lift up, and assist another Brother – and to exercise such conduct by acting in the same manner toward all mankind. By doing so, an observant Brother not only contributes to the erecting of his moral and Masonic edifice, but that Brother also helps lay the foundation for another Brother who is in the process of erecting a similar moral and Masonic edifice. Notably, this worthwhile Masonic principle exists in harmony with spiritual guidance, which instructs as follows: "Wherefore comfort yourselves together, and edify one another, even as also ye do." 1 Thessalonians 5:11 (KJV).

The impact of such Brotherly love and friendship extends beyond the ties that bind one Brother to Another. The practice by one Brother of such love and friendship will encourage other Brothers to embody the virtues that Freemasonry upholds, leading ineluctably to similar conduct by more Brothers – with the end result being an expanded beneficial impact not unlike the ever-growing concentric circles that flow outward from the spot where a stone breaks the surface of still water. Such consistency of practice, rather than performative theatrics, reflects positively on the Brotherhood. This principal of edification is, therefore, an integral component of Freemasonry that should start within the heart and mind of each Mason, with such principal being always in practice during Lodge meetings, while at refreshment and beyond the Lodge border. Ultimately, the salient goal of harmony and mutuality of purpose within the Lodge will then be sustained and expand outward to the Fraternity.

Notwithstanding the above, Freemasonry is indisputably not a monolith and its members are not required to march in lockstep or move about as a skein of geese. Because of this (but not in spite of this), it is wise to remember that we are always admonished to act with a Masonic heart and mind. It is similarly wise to remember that each Lodge is composed of Brothers who devote their time and treasure, within their means and abilities, for the benefit of their Brothers, their Lodge and, collectively, Freemasonry. As such, we as Masons should always act with an attentive ear, an instructive tongue, and a faithful breast – which is to say that Masons should endeavor to listen to and observe the needs and heartfelt intentions of our Brothers; provide good and wholesome counsel in response to those observed needs and intentions; and act in a manner that supports the moral, spiritual and intellectual edifices that Freemasonry intends for us to build.





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The importance of the Masonic values that have been instilled in each Brother's heart and mind – from the moment that each Brother of Temple Lodge #16 has stood in the northeast corner since 1790 – serve Freemasonry as virtuously today as they have in ages past. As such, it is my fervent hope that each Brother – within or without Temple Lodge #16 – will exemplify these Masonic values by contributing within their ability and means to do so but, where unable to do so, will contribute by recognizing the heartfelt effort and intention their Brothers now put forth to ensure that Temple Lodge #16 continues its Journey along the same continuum of time each Brother also travels. By recognizing the efforts our Brothers put forth, even when those efforts are directed at the beginning stages of a long-term goal upon which some disagreement may be exist, it will serve as a reminder to other Brothers to meet, if not exceed, the goal of standing a just and upright Mason and acting with a Masonic heart and mind.

The building of moral, spiritual and intellectual edifices – whether erecting one's own or assisting another Brother in doing the same – contributes to the health and welfare of Temple Lodge #16 and Freemasonry generally. Such important work will undoubtedly continue after this year ends and long after we, reading this as speculative Masons, lay down our working tools. But we should begin, or continue, the work today that was begun in the northeast corner of the Lodge.

I would like to conclude this message by recognizing some – but by no means all – Brothers who have contributed recently to the journey of Temple Lodge #16, a listing which clearly shows how a Lodge continues with the combined efforts of Brothers united in a common purpose. I would like to recognize Right Worshipful Brother David Stewart for taking his time to attend the November 1, 2025 Open House and guiding both a visiting Worshipful Brother from New York and other visitors about the Lodge. I would like to recognize Worshipful Brother Bruce Taylor for working with our most recent Entered Apprentices on their degree work and other education related to Freemasonry history. I would like to recognize the effort of Worshipful Brother Steve Blake and Worshipful Brother Phil Sharkey III in taking time to maintain our Lodge by keeping it in good repair and addressing needs as they arise. I would like to recognize the effort of Brother Jonathan Hartman for taking on the Second Section Lecture and to both he and Brother Kevin Dwyer for stepping up by offering to entering the line next year. I would like to recognize Worshipful Brother Jason "My Name is Jay" Polaski and Brother Phil Sharkey, Jr. for offering their time to assist me this year with good counsel, time and effort.
